After a kickoff seminar with all the partners at the beginning of September, during the Autumn, the students visit the partners on site and become acquainted with the structure, ambition and day-to-day working of each organisation. Context Project: Borders and Boundaries with guest seminars by Prof. Mustafa Dikec from Urban Studies and Stefanos Levidis - Forensic Architecture

Focusing on recent events in Malmö in relation to postcolonial theory and freedom of movement, students work with investigative methods - interviews, discourse analysis, speculative writing – to explore how borders are created within the city. To place the local events into a broader frame, Mustafa Dikec, author of *Urban Rage, the Revolt of the Excluded* discusses with participants the underlying dynamics of urban riots. In the seminar with Stefanos Levidis of Forensic Architecture, he gives an insight into the processes of FA focusing on projects on immigration and border territories.

Critical Thinking with Gigi Argyropoulou

During the *Critical Thinking* seminars, we explore the histories and complexities of performativity, context and citation, and read and discuss about politics, policies, the temporality of work, antagonisms, social turns, aesthetics and discontents. Starting with the old questions of “what is performance” and how we might “refuse to reproduce the situations of stuckness” we seek ways to talk about the now and to consider what failure and work mean for us personally, collectively and within the wider contexts we are part of.

***From Documents to Gestures* workshop with Arkadi Zaides**

Based on his concept of *Documentary Choreography*, Zaides will construct, together with the students, different modes of (re)activation of documents. His investigation focuses on how different types of documents can become an integral part of a choreographic research, and how to weave these types of factual information with embodied methodologies. It is also a way to question how the intersection between performative and documentary practices could open possibilities of articulating new modes of engagement and intervention in different socio-political contexts.

This autumn the research department will follow a trajectory around *Implicatedness in Dramaturgy* (professor Maaike Bleeker), *Improvisatory Cognition* (associate professor Sven Bjerstedt), *Instituting and Landscapes* (postdoc Gigi Argyropoulou) and *The Politicized Body* (associate professor Sofie Lebech and PhD John Hanse). As a joint effort we will introduce a new format *Thinking Together* where we invite researchers and artists to reflect on topics close to their theoretical, artistic, or curatorial practice in a public setting. The first event will evolve around the individual and collective body in the political sphere. We are continuing as active members of Lund University profile area *Human Rights*.

New post doc: Gigi Argyropoulou

We welcome our new Post Doc Gigi Argyropoulou. Gigi's research will focus on the relationship between performance, publics, social pedagogies and transformational infrastructures. The next two years Gigi will expand on her work processes of instituting and develop specific methodologies of

performance and curatorial practices that work *with and in* the landscape producing critical spatial forms and publics in response to ecological, political, and social challenges. [Read more here.](#)

The second edition of the workshop *All My Relations* unfolded this year the first weekend of September at Gylleboverket organized together with Agenda 2030






